Campground Reservation Terms and Conditions THINGS TO KNOW BEFORE MAKING A RESERVATION

I. Reservation & Access Requirements

- Reservations are Mandatory: All visitors, without exception, need a pre-booked reservation.
- Per Person Pricing: Reservations are priced per person, with a maximum of 12 people per reservation.
- Trip Leader is Key:
 - Only the person named on the reservation (the "Trip Leader") can check in.
 - They MUST be present with valid photo ID.
 - If the Trip Leader is not present, the reservation is void.

• Transfer System:

- Reservations are generally non-refundable, non-changeable, and non-transferable.
- The official Transfer System on HavasupaiReservations.com is the ONLY way to transfer spots.
- Transfers can be to a "Potential Alternate Trip Leader" (PATL) or via the public Cancellation/Transfer List.

PATL (Potential Alternate Trip Leader):

- A PATL can be designated in your account.
- A reservation can only be transferred to a PATL via the official Transfer System.
- A PATL cannot check in unless they become the new Trip Leader through the transfer system.

- Everyone Needs an Account: All visitors, even if not the Trip Leader or a PATL, must have an account on HavasupaiReservations.com to acknowledge the rules.
- Required Documents:
 - Printout of Account Information Page
 - Printout of Campground Reservation
 - Photo ID
 - These must be available at all times while on Havasupai lands.
- Vehicle Display: Campground Reservation Confirmation Code must be visible in the front windshield.

II. Food & Waste Management

- Bear Canisters Required: Each visitor must have a bear canister for food and anything with an odor.
- Odor-Proof Bags: Food and trash should be stored in Ziploc Freezer Bags or, ideally, odor-proof bags like OPSAK.
- Secure Storage: Unattended food and trash must be in the bear canister, kept outside of tents.
- Pack It Out: Everything brought in must be taken out.
- No Feeding Animals: Do not feed any animals.
- Exit Checks: Visitors may be checked upon exiting to ensure they have taken all gear and trash.

III. Rules & Regulations

- Strict Enforcement: Violations can result in permit termination, fines, and bans.
- Responsible Travel: Only visit with people you know well.
- No Reselling: Reselling reservations is strictly prohibited.
- Permits Included: Campground Reservation pricing includes all necessary permits, fees, and taxes.
- · Permitted Activities:
 - Driving to Hualapai Hilltop Trailhead

- Parking in the visitor parking area
- · Camping in the designated campground
- Hiking to/from the campground
- Visiting permitted areas of the creek and waterfalls (Fiftyfoot Falls, Little Navajo Falls, Havasu Falls, Mooney Falls, and Beaver Falls)

• Prohibited Items/Activities:

- Alcohol, drugs, smoking
- Drones, amplified music
- Littering, nudity
- Jumping, diving, climbing
- · Fishing, hunting
- Horses, dogs, pets, animals
- Wagons, carts, bikes, vehicles
- Fires, fireworks, firearms, weapons, water guns
- Boats, rafts, kayaks, paddle boards, inner tubes, pool floats, pool toys, styrofoam
- Filming or photography for commercial purposes
- Taking photos of Havasupai people or property
- Anything hazardous or discourteous
- Marijuana (even if legal in other states)
- Proper Attire: Dress appropriately.
- Cooking Stoves: Gas canister backpacking cooking stoves are permitted; other flame/fire is not.
- Federal Land: Havasupai Reservation is federal land, and federal laws apply.

IV. Trip Planning & Recommendations

• Best Time to Visit:

- · Cooler months are better for hiking.
- · Warmer months are better for swimming.

- Water temperature is roughly 70 degrees year-round.
- Air temperature is similar to Phoenix.
- Ideal Trip Length: All reservations are for 4 days / 3 nights.
- Recommended Itinerary:
 - Day 0: Arrive near the trailhead.
 - Day 1: Hike in, set up camp, explore.
 - Day 2 & 3: Explore waterfalls, relax.
 - Day 4: Hike out.
 - Day 5: Travel home or explore the region.

V. The Campground

- "Camp Wherever You Want": No designated campsites.
- Respectful Camping: Set up camp safely and respectfully.
- Composting Toilets: Located throughout the campground.
- Drinking Water: Available from a freshwater spring; filter all water.
- Quiet Hours: 8:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m.
- Lighting: Use red headlamps at night and minimize campsite lighting.
- Not Recommended for Young Children: Due to hazards and challenges.
- Critters: Store food securely to prevent access by mice, squirrels, etc.

VI. Hiking & Trail Information

- Beaver Falls Hike: Strenuous 7-mile round trip, for experienced hikers only.
- Hiking Beyond Beaver Falls: Not recommended, as it leaves Havasupai land.
- Hilltop Trailhead to Campground: 20-mile round trip hike with significant elevation change.
- Hiking Time: 4-6 hours in, 5-7 hours out.

- Mules and Horses: Always have the right of way.
- Trail Closure: The trail between the Hilltop and Supai is closed between sunset and 4:00 a.m.
- Night Hiking: Extremely dangerous and prohibited.
- Early Morning Hiking: Recommended, especially in summer.
- Water: Carry at least one gallon of water per person. No water is available at the trailhead or along the trail.
- Group Hiking: Stay together and do not hike alone.
- Restricted Areas: Respect the privacy of the village and do not take photos of people or property.
- Check-In: Trip Leader must check in with photo ID and get wristbands for everyone.
- Campground Entrance: 2 miles from the Tourist Check-In Office.

VII. Getting to the Hilltop Trailhead

- Location: End of Indian Road 18, 60 miles from Route 66.
- Drive Time: 1.5-2 hours on Indian Road 18.
- Gas: Fill up before heading down Indian Road 18.
- Parking: Park in designated areas, not on the road or in the helipad area.
- No Public Transportation: To/from the trailhead.

VIII. General Information

- Havasupai Sovereignty: Respect the land, people, and their rules.
- Federal Trust Land: Trespassing is a violation of Tribal and Federal Law.
- Jurisdiction: Entrance constitutes consent to the civil jurisdiction of the Havasupai Tribe.
- Accountability: You are responsible for the actions of everyone on your reservation.
- Sex Offenders: Not permitted to visit.
- Safety: Be alert, carry water, and be prepared for weather conditions.
- Monsoon Season: Be aware of increased risk of rain and flash flooding (July-September).
- Emergency Situations: No public health facilities in Supai. Evacuation is expensive and the responsibility of the injured party.
- **Trip Insurance**: Highly recommended.
- No Refunds: For violations, closures, or emergencies.

- Property: Safeguard personal belongings.
- Liability: You agree to assume the risk of activities and release the Havasupai Tribe from liability.
- Terms Subject to Change: All terms, conditions, rules, etc. are subject to change without notice.
